Essential Knowledge

- American Indians were the first people who lived in Virginia.
- Christopher Columbus called them "Indians" because he thought he landed in the Indies near China.
- Virginia Indians are referred to as "Eastern Woodland Indians" because of the dense forests that cover most of the land.
- Artifacts found by archaeologists include: arrowheads, pottery and other objects. These tell us a lot about the way Indians lived.

<u>Werowocomoco</u>

- large Indian town
- headquarters of Chief Powhatan
- located along the James River, 16 miles south of Jamestown

<u>Climate</u>

(Weather)

- mild (not too hot, not too cold)
- variety of vegetation (plants)
- 4 distinct seasons: spring, summer, winter, fall


• live in similar ways as other Americans: foods, housing, schools, jobs


